Personal Sanctuary ~ Holiness at Home

Some of you may remember when our choir beautifully sang the song “Sanctuary” at our first service back in our own beautiful Sanctuary after the renovations needed from Hurricane Florence. Here are the words that were sung:

*O God prepare me, to be a sanctuary, pure and holy, tried and true...
With thanksgiving, I'll be a living, sanctuary for You.*

What a perfect sentiment for us as we prayed together again in our sacred space. Yes, our Temple sanctuary- the oldest in all of North Carolina and one of the oldest Jewish sanctuaries in use in the United States- is a special and meaningful space. For many of you it has even deeper meanings because of life-cycle events that took place there.

I, too, love our sanctuary. One of the reasons I love it is because when I am there I can sense two main attributes of the word “sanctuary,” a sense of safety and a sense of sacredness. For that is the goal of any sanctuary- to be a safe and sacred space.

As you know, we won't be able to be in our Temple sanctuary as we usher in this New Year of 5771. Therefore, we need to harken to the words of our sacred Torah where in Exodus 25:8, we are instructed by God, ***“Let them make Me a sanctuary so that I may dwell among them.”*** While the literal understanding of the text is to build a physical sanctuary, I much prefer a more transcendental understanding.

Not just for the physical, but in all ways, we should build a sanctuary (a holy place) so that God can dwell among us. While it is wonderful to have a safe and sacred place to pray with God, it is far more important to know that God is with us always- not just in a tangible space. Furthermore, can we understand God as truly dwelling within us- not just among us?

So this year as we worship together from our own personal safe space, let us do all we can to make our homes and ourselves into a true sanctuary. For example, you may want to dress in something special for services- maybe even wear white which is traditional. Also wearing a Tallit and/or Kippah (yarmulke) may enhance the ability to feel holy even at home. You might consider adding flowers or a piece of Judaica. Feel free to share more ideas on how to create a personal sanctuary.

May this New Year be a year in which we can always have holiness among and within us!

In the recent August Temple of Israel Bulletin our President, Morris Levy, advised you that a newly created Strategic Planning Committee has been formed. I have accepted the chairmanship of the Committee. Serving with me are Connie Heymann, Malinda Zimmerman, Dana Crater, Barry Newman, and Dr. Eric Rosenberg. Each of us brings a unique and proven skill set to the process of analyzing the needs and future of the Temple of Israel and our community's stability.

As the High Holy Days approach, we as Jews will be reflecting about the year 5780, which is ending, and looking forward to the New Year 5781. The

Strategic Planning Committee will be beginning a similar review, incorporating a long term perspective in order to develop a strategic direction and plan of action to ensure a stable future for Temple of Israel. This planning activity is intended to identify and define priorities, strengthen operations, identify objectives and focus on the critical resources that the Temple will need as it moves forward.

One can vote early, on election day or by absentee ballot. To ensure you know the hours and locations of voting places, go to <https://www.ncsbe.gov/> and look for your precinct and county. If you wish to vote by absentee ballot, click on request an absentee ballot (under "vote"). Print, complete and sign the form and send it back as soon as possible or drop it off at your local Board of Elections.

The deadline for absentee ballot requests is Oct. 27th. Absentee ballots will be mailed beginning Sept. 4th. Ensure it is complete and signed, and then mail, or drop off, your ballot at the Board of Elections as soon as possible. If you drop it at a polling place, you will have to stand in line as if you were voting in person. You might want to check out Vote411.org for information on the candidates and other information.

The Lifelong Learning Committee has been working overtime to provide active adult learning online during this time of social isolation.

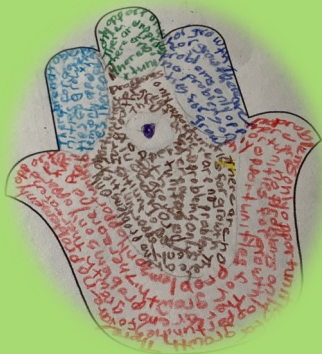

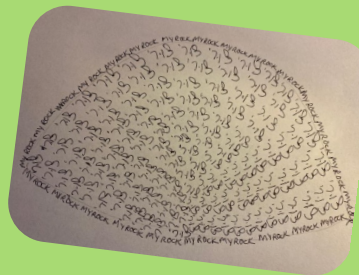
