AN EVENING with RABBI SALLY PRIESAND Wednesday, Dec 15th at 7:30pm on Zoom

In honor of this year being the 50th anniversary of women being ordained as Rabbis, we will have a special program with the first ordained woman in the United States, Rabbi Sally Priesand.

When I was nine years old my family moved, and we switched synagogues to join the one closest to our new home. At our new congregation the Rabbi was a man, and the Cantor was also a man. Whereas at our previous congregation the rabbi was a man, and the Cantor was a woman. At our first service at the new temple, I vividly remember saying to my mom, "*you mean men can be Cantors too?*" My mom seemingly chuckled and said "yes."

I don't think I even asked about whether women could be rabbis. I had never seen one, so maybe I thought it wasn't possible, even though this was in the late 1980s. By that time women had already been ordained as Rabbis for roughly 15 years. It would be at least another five years until I met a female rabbi for the first time and then I also learned that the first female rabbi was



Rabbi Sally Priesand who was ordained in 1972.

As I dived deeper into my Judaism, Rabbi Priesand became like a hero to me. She was a trail blazer and a legend. Once I realized I wanted to become a Rabbi, I knew that I owed a debt of gratitude to her, as she had literally paved the way for me. I met her for the first time at a Rabbinic Conference in 2008, just two months before I was to be ordained. It felt like meeting a rock star! She was gracious, kind and even took a picture with me. Over the last 14 years, I am grateful to say that my hero has become both my colleague and my friend.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of Rabbi Priesand's ordination. Biblically, this time of 50 years is known as a Jubilee and this is truly a tremendous milestone for all Jews. Even now, fifty years after she became a Rabbi, I often meet people who tell me that they didn't know women could be rabbis. As we all know, YES, women can be rabbis!

I am so excited to share that on **Wednesday, December 15th at 7:30pm** we will have a very special program with Rabbi Sally Priesand as we hear all about her journey. I hope that you'll attend our program and invite others to join in, as well.

Rabbi Priesand has opened doors for equality and together we have the opportunity to celebrate with her and thereby celebrate everyone who has walked through those doors as well- including me!

### Getting to Know the Temple of Israel

How well do you know the Temple of Israel? Most, if not all, of the people who read this Bulletin have seen our building, which sits at the corner of Market and 4<sup>th</sup> Streets in downtown Wilmington's historic district. It does not look like the buildings around it, because our synagogue was built during 1875 and 1876 in the Moorish Revival style popular for synagogues in Europe and the United States at that time.

It was the first synagogue of any kind in North Carolina, and one of very few Moorish Revival style synagogues still standing in the U.S. (the others being in New York City and Cincinnati, which interestingly was the population center of the U.S. at the time).

Moorish Revival style is recognized by its two towers with an onion dome topping each one. Its windows are tall with well-rounded arches atop. The windows in our Temple are filled with stained glass in an abstract design of blue, yellow, and red. The windows let in a wonderful warm light during the day and reflect magical colors at night. A rounded arch also tops the main door above the twin stairs from street level.



A plaque from the Historic Wilmington Foundation, Inc., outside the front door of the Temple, lists the architect as Samuel Sloan of Philadelphia. The photograph of the plaque (accompanying) also shows the rounded arches above one of the smaller windows and above the main door.

The plaque says the synagogue was built for German Jewish immigrants who settled in Wilmington. Most of them came from Bavaria. They had names like Abram Weill, Solomon Bear, Frederick Rheinstein, Nathaniel Jacobi, and others (see <u>The</u> <u>History of the Temple of Israel Wilmington, North Carolina</u> by Beverly Tetterton, our current president).

To found the Temple, the leaders, who mostly lived within walking distance of the site and who owned stores along Front Street, met at the home of Abram Weill on Nov. 9, 1871. Forty men pledged support to build the Temple. They reached out to their fellow Jews and to members of the larger community.

According to Beverly Tetterton's book (page 6), on November 26, 1872 a local newspaper the *Morning Star* stated that "*In view of* 

the fact that our fellow citizens of the Israelitish faith have always evinced a liberal disposition when called upon to assist in enterprises for the benefit of other denominations, or the city generally, their call for help to build them a suitable house of worship should meet with a hearty and generous response. It must be remembered that they are, but a handful as compared with other denominations, and must of necessity rely upon a certain outside aid. That this will be liberally bestowed we have no doubt."

In less than three years, land was purchased and plans were drawn to build the Temple of Israel's \$20,000 building (\$500,000 in today's money). Limited by the technology of the time, heating was by coal, lighting was by candles, and sanitary facilities were not provided (an outhouse not being located on the property).

### Getting to Know the Temple of Israel (...continued)

If these accommodations sound crude, it is helpful to remember that 1876 was almost 150 years ago. It was only 100 years after the 13 colonies, North Carolina among them, declared their independence from Great Britain. It was eleven years after the Civil War officially ended; several years went by before this news spread across the nation. Women still wore dresses with bustles and tight waistlines; men wore whiskers and high collars. 1876 was the same year that the newly patented telephone, megaphone, and phonograph went on the market. The first Remington typewriter came out in 1874. Albert Einstein was yet to be born in Germany (1879). (All this according to <u>americasbesthistory.com/abhtimeline1870.html</u>)

1876 was a long time ago, yet our Temple's founders had the courage and foresight to build an unusual and proud synagogue on the corner of the main street in town. They built it the best they could and left it to succeeding generations to care for it, which they did by installing oil lighting (in 1883) and electricity in 1905, and making repairs to the magnificent, tall, stained-glass windows and slate roof as time went on and the inevitable hurricanes swept through. But the founders and many people in Wilmington loved this building, which became a long-standing symbol of Jewish integration and prosperity in this southern town. Today, many people still love it and acknowledge the people who built it.

You've seen the outside, but have you been inside the Temple of Israel? Some of our newest members have not yet had a chance to fully experience our building due to damage from water and deterioration from old age. In assessing the issues with our building, mold and other forms of decay were discovered on the ground floor. These problems were due, in large measure, to unrecognized water intrusion that has been stopped temporarily but which needs to be corrected before we can reopen the building. Raising the necessary funds has become imperative. The 150-Restoration Committee has taken on this task and is successfully raising money from congregants, friends, and neighbors.

Next time, we will focus on the incredibly tall stained-glass windows and the other sources of light in this warm and comforting temple that has impressed visitors and congregants for so many years.
