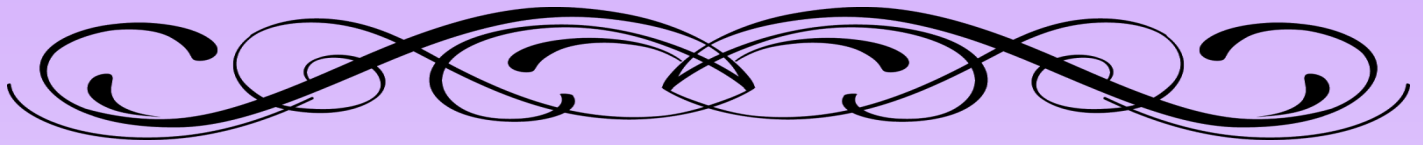

Convergence of Dates and Ideals by Rabbi Emily Losben-Ostrov

Society may debate the causes, the effects and even the name, but there is no denying that we are facing an environmental crisis. We could cite the plastics in the ocean, the pollution in the air, the landfills filled to capacity as cause for serious concern. However, we in the Wilmington area know this disaster firsthand as we live in a city where we can't even drink the tap water. Some of us have expensive reverse-osmosis filtration systems and others buy water, which of course leads to more environmental issues. What about the more than 23% of our population here that live at or below the poverty line- how can they afford the luxury of safe drinking water?

This month we will celebrate Tu B'Shevat – our Jewish Earth Day and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr Day both on the same day. At first it might not seem logical, but the truth is there is huge connection between the fight for environmental justice and for racial justice. In December of 1967, Dr. King sermonized that *"It really boils down to this: that all life is interrelated. We are all caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied into a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one destiny, affects all indirectly."* To us as Jews this is clear through our imperative for Tikkun Olam- we must fix the world- not just for ourselves but for everyone!

And we have to start somewhere- even with small steps. As such, Temple of Israel will be participating with St. Stephen's AME Church for a very special experience in honor of both MLK Day and Tu B'Shevat. Together we hope to break down barriers by breaking ground with a special evening Zoom program, followed by a tree-planting ceremony. On **Thursday, January 20th at 7pm** you are invited to join me, Reverend Thomas Nixon and the members of St. Stephens for a special Zoom program as we spend time sharing about our Reform Jewish faith and the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) tradition, as well as the impressive histories of both our historic, sacred sanctuaries. We will also have time for fellowship on Zoom by way of the breakout rooms. Then, on **Sunday, January 23rd at 2pm** we hope you'll join us at St. Stephens (501 Red Cross Street) as together we plant a tree and continue to plant the seeds for working together.

Additionally we will honor Dr. King on **Friday, January 14th at 7pm** at Shabbat Services as Reverend Cheryl Walker will be our special guest speaker and on **Sunday, January 16th at 4pm** on Zoom at the annual Interfaith Service for MLK Day. We will also celebrate Tu B'Shevat with a joint tree planting experience with B'nai Israel on **Wednesday, January 19th at 4pm** at Wallace Park and will honor the holiday at Shabbat Services on Friday, January 21st.

No single person, single faith or single group can solve the problems we are facing. If we even want to attempt to repair our very broken world, we must become united. Let us take the first steps by coming together as a congregation, with other holy congregations, so that collectively we can heal our world for all of us!

GETTING TO KNOW

THE TEMPLE OF ISRAEL, PART 2

Last time we talked about our sanctuary's architectural style, the Moorish-revival style that was popular in the US and Europe in 1876 when our temple building was completed. We said that in our second article we would discuss what many congregants and visitors have commented on: the very special light they find in our sanctuary and how that light affects them. We'll focus on the windows, which were originally constructed from glass imported from France.

Day-time services are held for the High Holy Days (Days of Awe and prayer), and for life-cycle events like weddings, bar mitzvahs for boys, bat mitzvahs for girls, baby namings, and funerals. During these services, light enters the building through the tall, stained-glass windows and bathes the worshipers in a warm and soothing, yet at the same time colorful and uplifting glow. See the daylight shining on a mahogany-stained, heart pine pew in the attached picture.

Rabbi Emeritus James Apple (Navy Capt. Ret. and Th.D.) says:

When I had to counsel a congregant during the day, I would always counsel in the Temple sanctuary. Why? The sunlight, as it shone through the windows, helped the individual's problem get resolved or at least not be as serious as the person thought it to be. There were days when I would sit in the sanctuary and meditate...enjoying the peace, quiet, and the colors of the rainbow as they filled the sanctuary. This is one of the reasons that I feel so strongly about saving the Temple. Those windows, in capturing the sunlight, exert a healing process to an aching soul.

Our Shabbat services are held at night. The illumination comes from several sources; one that we will discuss in a future article is the beautiful, centuries-old crystal chandelier that hangs in the center of the sanctuary.

At night, the windows let the light from within our sanctuary shine forth with a jewel-like, sparkling glow that illuminates not just the corner of Market and Fourth Streets where the sanctuary sits, but well beyond. I think that this beautiful, joyous effect comes from more than the large, colorful windows. To me it includes a spiritual light from within the sanctuary. The windows compliment that light beautifully. That's one of the many reasons I love this sanctuary and want to restore and re-open it.
