
STATISTICS.

As English speakers, when talking about our Jewish rite of passage, we sometimes say things like "I was bat mitzvahed" or "I had my Bar Mitzvah." However, the proper way to discuss this crucial moment is to say that you "became a Bar Mitzvah" or that you will become a "Bat Mitzvah." Yes, Hebrew is a complicated language. In this instance, it is an important distinction in understanding the real meaning of the event. That is to say that as Jews, at the age of 13 a person is recognized as a Jewish adult. They become a "child of the Commandment," which means they are now obligated (allowed) to follow the mitzvot. Did you become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah? Do you remember the ceremony or the celebration (or the fountain pen)? Did one of your children go through this Jewish rite of passage and become a B'nai Mitzvah? We'd love to hear about your experiences and even see your pictures!

I hope you'll join us in person or on Zoom when six of our Temple members finally "officially" become Bat Mitzvah or Bar Mitzvah on Saturday, May 14th at 10:30am. 



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Getting to Know the Temple of Israel – May 2022 – Moving Forward By Naomi Kleid with help from Beverly Tetterton

Approximately six months ago, I promised to write six articles about the history of the Temple for the monthly Bulletin. With this article, my promise has now been met. Along the way, I've received help from many people mentioned in the by-lines; one who hasn't been mentioned is amazing and wonderful Nancy Robert, our Temple Administrator. Thank you Nancy, and thank you to all the other wonderful helpers.

But lots of topics remain to be covered, so the articles need to go on with a different by-line. I have some suggestions about topics and how we can move forward by helping each other.

For topics, there's the blessing that our Sanctuary shares with the church across the street and the story of how both congregations acquired the same blessing. Anyone want to write a short article on this charming topic? It's well documented and Beverly has pictures. This article should be easy to write.

There's also the story of how our services started in the basement of the Temple building, now known as Rosenthal Hall. How the current prayer space upstairs was created later without an indoor connection to the downstairs – congregants had to use the outside staircases until internal stairs were added later, and then redesigned so that restrooms could finally be provided. When was the warming kitchen added and who paid for that? And who paid for the wonderful elevator that provides access for congregants who can't use stairs?

We have an historic Sanctuary, but our Sanctuary's ceiling has acoustic tiles – that's certainly not historically accurate. But what is? A sanctuary in New York City built about the same time as ours talks about its tiled ceiling. What was our original ceiling made of? President Beverly Tetterton recalls seeing a dark wood board-and-batten ceiling in early pictures of our sanctuary. She thinks it was constructed with a crawl space to service the chandelier (perhaps when the chandelier was electrified). What were the materials used in our original ceiling? And what is the history of the chandelier? How did it get to Wilmington from Germany, and who paid to purchase and ship it? Do any of our readers want to research answers to these questions?

The Ladies Concordia Society (originally called the Harmony Club) has always had a very active role in raising funds for the Sanctuary and the school. Exactly what roles have they played over the years? Does anyone from LCS want to write one or more articles about this?

President Beverly Tetterton has given us a beautiful, informative book about our Sanctuary with a section on LCS. The book is called: The History of the Temple of Israel Wilmington, North Carolina. And Leonard Rogoff has given us descriptions of the social and historical contexts in which our Sanctuary was constructed. His book is called: Down Home: Jewish Life in North Carolina. But no two books can fully address all possible questions about our historic building – not even an encyclopedia could do that.

But many of our older members still remember how things used to be and why things were changed or not changed. Would some of our new members or a group of students from our school like to interview some of our older congregants and document what they remember? This would be a wonderful way to provide answers to some of our questions while the answers still live in our congregants' memories. Please don't let this opportunity pass. This project could create closer bonds among the generations within our congregation.

There are many ways our congregation can move forward. Let's save our beautiful building and save our history. Let's share our stories, love, and knowledge with each other.
